Emotivism

You can't say moral statements are 'true' or 'false' because they're just how we feel.

"X is good" is an emotional exclamation. It doesn't mean any more than saying

• There are no objective moral truths.

"Wahey X!"

 You pick your moral principles by following your feelings.

Intuitionism

You can't prove moral truths (just like you can't prove that the physical world exists) - you just know.

- "Good" is indefinable.Basic moral truths are self-evident to a mature mind.
- There are objective moral truths.

Prescriptivism

When making moral statements, we need to be consistent, imagining ourselves on the receiving end. We should want everyone to behave as we have prescribed.

- "You ought to do X" is a universalisable prescription - an instruction, not a fact.
- You need to be informed, imaginative and consistent.
- There are no objective moral truths, but some moral claims are selfcontradictory.

Abortion

Examples

- Catholic Nicaraguan girl, 9 years old, raped
 doctors excommunicated
- 1973, Roe vs Wade a woman has a constitutional right to abort (USA); in 2003 'Roe' changed her mind
- 2001, Rev Jepson tried to charge doctors for aborting a 28 week foetus with a cleft palette
- ♦ Under 16s don't require parental consent
- 2001, Stephen Hone failed to stop ex from aborting their child
- Rowan Williams wants laws reviewed due to scientific advancements

Case studies and headlines

- Thomas Hyde, ALS (what Stephen Hawking has), Dr Kevorkian helped him to die in the US
- Dianne Pretty, motor neurone disease, UK courts would not let her have help to die
- Dax Cowart, extensive burns, US, was not allowed to die and suffered years of painful treatment
- Tony Bland, Hilsborough victim left in a Persistent Vegetative State (PVS) had his life support system turned off
- **+** Euthanasia policy (alleged) for hurricane Katrina victims
- **BMA** no longer opposes euthanasia laws
- 'Million Dollar Baby' and 'The Sea Inside' support a proeuthanasia stance
- Dutch doctors called for euthanasia for some newborns
- Brits travel to Switzerland to die
- Dr Kevorkian helped over 100 to die; he finally went to prison when he pressed the button for Thomas Youk (who had ALS and couldn't move to press it himself)
- The Voluntary Euthanasia Society is now called Dignity in Dying

 STATEMENT OF HOW SOMEONE WOULD LIKE TO
 BE TREATED IF THEY FALL SERIOUSLY ILL
- PERSISTENT VEGITATIVE STATE (PVS) BRAIN-STEM DEAD WITH NO HOPE OF RECOVERY
